cept a job.

"And that is most important,
I think,' said his wife.

"We have explored almost every possible avenue for em-ployment for the doctor," said the Rev. Robert F. Meineke, pastor of the Messiah Lutheran Church, "but so far without luck."

DR. SONNTAG, his wife, and three sons escaped what is now the eastern sector of Germany in 1945 just before the Russians, arrived. He had an "excellent" practice there, and his wife was his assistant.

"It was impossible to stay in East Germany," said the doctor, "because of my sons. They would have had to join the organization, and they couldn't go to high school in East Germany."

When the family made their escape, they were forced to leave their home, their furnishings, everything they owned and had worked for.

WEST GERMANY, where they had lived until coming to America, was crowded with im-migrants from the East.

"There was not much business," he said of his practice in West Germany, "for there were many, many professional men there."

Dr. Sonntag has only two problems in America. Neither he nor his family speaks English fluently. And Dr. Sonntag cannot win a license to practice dentistry here until he has become a citizen. That will take five years, he said.

In the meantime, he had hoped to find related work.

WHILE he searches, the family has no immediate problems.

"If we had in Germany what we have here," said his wife, "we would be classed as rich people.

"This house, television, water cooling, refrigerator, and canned goods—Ahhhhh."

MRS. SONNTAG, an attractive woman with a broad education like her husband, said if she had it to do over, despite their problems, "I would come here."

"Home life is easier here: hot "Home life is easier here; not and cold water, washing ma-chine. And the people are more friendly here. The people in the hospitals where the doctor has gone for work, they have all the time for us. Never too busy."

Mrs. Sonntag said she is considering work here. A dental assistant to her husband for many years, she said, "I pick up quickly."

Her husband added, "I've had lots of assistants and my wife is the best one."

As for Dr. Sonntag, "I will do anything. I have worked in Scotland in the herring trade, and East Africa in the bricks."
